Their drawings represent their affected siblings as they actually appear in the situation described, the two different realities of disease and normal life are intermingled, and references to death or pain are more explicit.



In patients' drawings belonging to the second category, teachers and school are often represented as reassuring people and environment that maintain, even in hospital, the characteristics of attention and listening, of interaction devoid of any prejudice, shown in daily life. Emotional involvement of school teachers in hospital is not so different

from that characterizing their school activity outside the hospital, where they are in contact with ill students that they consider with equality.




When we receive a message, the most important thing to remember is that, irrespective of the means of communication, the message itself should not remain simply the topic of a scientific paper nor be considered satisfactory because we collected data. **Information is of relative** value, while the important thing is the request it implies, since the child who has made it is waiting for an answer.



Inadequate procedures exercised upon children in hospitals: separating children from their parents, particulary in the course of invasive procedures frightening effects of the atmosphere of the hospital on the child denials of pain-killers for mistaken fear of possible later addiction denials of information both to children and parents as well as explantations about the illness and the ways of its treatment • the use of aids to immobilize the child in the course of an invasive procedure is painful or not

The new approach to children in hospital:

- current situations are changing all over the world
- the basis for the development of the world idea of the open hospital in relation to children
- the beginnings of this idea can be found in the year 1980, and resulted in the Charter on the Children's Rights in Hospital, passed by the European Parliament in 1986
- In 1989 UNICEF and the World Health Organization (WHO) started the worldwide initiative for the acceptance of breastfeeding
- The good acceptance of breast-feeding initiative stimulated the defining of some other new programmes



The goal of the action in Croatia

- the promotion and applied humanization of hospital treatment of children
- the action applies to children from the day were born to the end of their elementary school education, and its carried out continuously in the course of the year, during all time children spend in hospital
- The action is carried out in hospital, in the children's ward, through joint participation of medical staff and professional experts and social workers outside the hospital, the Society Our Children and similar associations and institutions



The programme propositions in Croatia

- 1. Workout and announcement of the annual plan for participation in the action
- 2. Admission of the chid into hospital provided it is best solution for the child itself
- 3. Maximal shortering of the child's stay in hospital
- 4. The doctor's holistic approach to the sick child



The programme propositions in Croatia

- 5. Nursing care of the sick childadditional training of the practical nurses
- 6. Application of modern medical standards for the child's stay in hospital
- 7. Individual approach to each child, respecting individual needs
- 8. Parent's daily visits to the sick child should be made possible

- 9. Encouragement of parental participation in the nursing and treatment of the child
- 10. Pedagogical, cultural and entertainment contents for children in hospital
- 11. Games and activities that children themselves choose and participate in them
- 12. Creating a more improved and functiona lhospital environment

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
The Organization

- Employs Play Leaders to organise play activities in the hospital playrooms to support the Child Life Specialists' work

Mother recognised the importance of play in hospital Set up rota of friends to organise play activities on the ward



Peg Belson (1990)


- Founding member of the National Association for the Welfare of Children in Hospital, UK (NAWCH) now <u>Action for Sick Children</u>


- Open to the general public
